The programme was conducted by Master Soham Sao who oversaw the entire organisation under the aegis of the student council.


The winning house was Gandhi, followed by Tagore, Nehru and Netaji.




SOLDTERS

### THE RHODODENDRON TRAIL 3RD- 7TH APRIL 2022

A trekking expedition to Sandakphu comprising of 19 boys and 2 teachers began with a lot of excitement from Dhotrey and the destination for Day 1 was Tumlin, which is nearly 6 kilometres from Dhotrey. Fortunately, as fate would have it, as we headed towards Kalipokhri approximately 18 kilometres away from Tumling, we came across a bamboo forest where awaited a Red Panda.

Though it was a long tiring walk, the sight of the lake more than made up for the exhaustion, and one cannot but be thankful because the sore feet and legs helped us sleep through brutally cold nights.

The last phase of our ascent began with a challenge as the harsh freezing wind blew and we had to climb various inclined slope to reach Sandakphu which was approximately 7 kilometres from Kaliphokri .

Slowly but surely around 2 hours later, our tired legs did scale the highest point of West Bengal, unfortunately as was the case with our previous batch of trekkers, the gods didn't wish for us to see the Sleeping Buddha.

Despite the tiny disappointment, we could not help but pose for photographs that will encapsulate a little bit of heaven for all of us.

The following day which was rather the last day of the excursion, we headed towards Srikhola, 18 unforgettable kilometres, which took us around 7 hours to cover. What was memorable about Srikhola was the opportunity to dip ourselves in the fresh mountain waters, sparkling in glee as it winded down the cliffs.

Penultimately, the fun did come to an end, but not before a brief halt at Mirik, where we got to roam and accustom ourselves with the maddening crowd that we had left behind a few days ago to embrace Mother Nature.

We owe our health, security and safety to our teachers Mr. J.P Hembrom and Mr Norden Tamang, who were kind and patient with us through the trek.
